

- 4. You can only do an apprenticeship in a trade
- 5. Employers don't keep apprentices on after they've completed their apprenticeship

What are apprenticeships?

Main components



- A real job with a real employer
- Paid a salary
- Qualifications and experience
- 20% of time is off-the-job
- Contract of employment, holiday, sick pay
- Support from a training provider
- -1-4 years

- ✓ Strong, motivated students who know what they want to do
- ✓ Those who have proved their passion through a hobby or work experience
- ✓ Confident in interviews and working with others
- ✓ Not just about the grades

What are employers looking for?

Passionate and enthusiastic applicants.

"Your application needs to sell you, be engaging, show your interest and enthusiasm and give an insight into your personality. Avoid humour though, this is still a professional document"

Clear and relevant to the role.

"Good applicants have well written application forms where they have taken the time to give examples of their skills and have a good balance between academic achievement and enthusiasm for the job/industry that they are applying for"


Accurate and grammatically correct.

"Avoid poor spelling, grammar and punctuation. This is critical if you want to be taken seriously in your application. Ask someone else with a good eye for detail to proofread your application before you submit it"


